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OUR HISTORY

School on Wheels, Inc. was founded in 1993 by Agnes Stevens, a retired teacher. After reading Jonathan Kozol's *Rachel and her Children*, Agnes realized the extent of homelessness in the US. She began tutoring homeless kids in a park in Santa Monica, encouraging them to stay in school and participate in school activities.

OUR MISSION

Since 1993, we have never wavered from our mission: to enhance educational opportunities for homeless children from kindergarten through twelfth grade. Our goal is to shrink the gaps in their education and provide them with the highest level of education possible. Our program serves as a consistent support system to homeless students at a time of great stress and fear. We bring the message to our students that they are cared about and important.

The children served by School on Wheels may not have a home but they can still have hope. For 20 years, volunteers have tutored thousands of children who have grown up to succeed in high school, college, and life. Not every child we tutor will obtain such success. But supporters like you give each child a chance. Last year, over 2,800 homeless children were provided a better path to educational success. This is an achievement that we all should be proud of. Because of your efforts, the children we serve have a better opportunity to attain the future that they not only hope for, but deserve.

















20 IMPRESSIVE VEARS



2013 was a year of celebration for School on Wheels. We commemorated our 20th anniversary and we surpassed one of the benchmarks of our strategic plan by tutoring 2,813 homeless children. We had many other noteworthy achievements that you will read about in this report, including recruiting 1,703 outstanding volunteers and having more remarkable donors than ever before. School on Wheels continues to make smart investments in homeless children throughout Southern California as we expanded programs and increased our

commitment to enhancing their educational lives. We fostered new partnerships while exploring innovative opportunities, allowing us to put 93% of every dollar into our programs. We are proud of our collective accomplishments, but we are humbled - and outraged – by the need that persists. Over 163,435 children are homeless in just the school districts we serve.

Education and knowledge bring enormous returns to society. Not only does education lessen unemployment – the unemployment rate for those with less than a high school diploma is nearly three times higher than that of Americans with bachelor's degrees – but it also improves health outcomes and life span. Women with less than a high school diploma have a life expectancy 10 years shorter than those with 16 years of education. In terms of income, education pays. An adult with a university degree in the U.S. earns, on average, 72% more than someone with a high school diploma.

This is why we do what we do. Education matters. It matters deeply for our homeless students. It is one of the few ways they can break the cycle of homelessness and poverty. I know education matters to you too. I believe School on Wheels' greatest strength is a conviction shared by our donors, volunteers, friends, partners, Board and staff, that every child deserves an education and that the homeless child is no exception.

Through our unique combination of passion, partnerships, innovation, business skills, bold thinking and focus on results and outcomes, we can achieve our goals. We can gather the resources, we have the experience and skills, and we have you – our incredible and amazing supporters who have made us the organization we are today. We thank you all for your contributions of funds, time and talents this year. We are incredibly grateful for your partnership and we look forward to continuing our work together as we strive to educate the most vulnerable children in our communities. Together, we are changing lives.


PROGRAM RESULTS

Overview


2013 was a big year for School on Wheels. We celebrated 20 years as a nonprofit organization. We broke the world record for the longest line of backpacks. We hosted a sunset gala at Paradise Cove in Malibu. Most importantly, we finished the year by achieving our goals of tutoring 2,813 students with the help of 1,703 volunteers! We also:

- Distributed 4,264 brand new backpacks filled with school supplies
- Awarded 10 scholarships to deserving students to help them knock down their educational barriers
- Initiated our blended learning program by instructing over 300 students using educational programs on laptops and tablets
- Provided 3,000 bus tokens so that children could get to school and so their parents had the opportunity to be there with them on their first days
- Received very positive outcome feedback from our students and their parents



FINANCIAL RESULTS

Our donors keep the wheels on the bus turning. In 2013, we achieved our goal of over \$1,400,000 in revenues. At the same time, we held our administration expenses to 4.1% and 93 cents of every dollar helped expand and improve our academic educational programs.





"It is always great to have a student who sets an excellent example for their peers, and thankfully we have Anthony! Patricia was the first student I tutored. At eightyears-old, the eldest of four children, she had been living at the shelter following the death of her father. Despite all her obstacles, she still had the strength to focus on her education. It wasn't always easy. I remember one session:

Me: "It's your 9th birthday. Are you excited?" Patricia: "I'd rather be 14."

Me: "Why 14?" (thinking she'd say she could wear make-up or do fun things)

Patricia: "Then I could work to make money to get out of here."

When I left, tears were streaming down my cheeks. Later, however, I realized that though I couldn't help with her housing, I knew that during our sessions, she didn't have to think about any hardships or heartbreaks. She was visiting the solar system, mastering her times tables, laughing at silly adjectives when we played Mad Libs. It wasn't about escaping. It was about becoming empowered through knowledge and the ultimate possibility of a brighter future.

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
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


